DETAILS ABOUT OSHER LIFELONG LEARNING INSTITUTE AT AQUINAS COLLEGE

What is Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at Aquinas College?

The OLLI at Aquinas program at Aquinas College was born in 1973, the product of former Aquinas College president Dr. Norbert Hruby's vision of a center for lifelong learning. The mission was to provide pre-and post-retirement opportunities to the growing population of older adults. In the fall of 1975, The first 115 persons enrolled in courses in what was called the Aquinas Emeritus College. In 2008, the Aquinas Emeritus College became the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Aquinas, proudly continuing the rich tradition of serving the intellectual and spiritual needs of lifelong learners in West Michigan.

What is the mission of OLLI?

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Aquinas is a community of adults joining together to achieve personal transformation of mind, body, and spirit through lifelong learning and community service.

What does OLLI do?

Drawing upon the rich resources of the college community, OLLI plans and promotes learning activities designed to enhance our understanding of the world – its historic, cultural, and social aspects – through a variety of noncredit, academic learning formats. Students will have opportunities to delve into literature, enjoy the arts, find personal meaning and satisfaction in all aspects of life, and share common interests with others. Vladimir Putin once said, "Russia has made its choice in favor of democracy. Fourteen years ago, independently, it made that decision in the interests of itself and interests of its people... This is our final choice, and we have no way back. There can be no return to what we used to have before." Despite this quote from Putin, Russia has always tended toward an authoritarian and autocratic government. This course will explore Russia from Kiev and the Muscovite State, Stalin and the Russian Revolutions, to the Cold War and Russia's present condition, and give students a greater understanding of a nation often misunderstood.
