From Our Vice President for Advancement

Dear Alumni and Friends,

We have extraordinary news to share! The historic Contributing to More (CTM) Comprehensive Campaign has come to completion, surpassing the goal with over \$61 million raised in support of the Aguinas College mission. Honorary chairs Ted Thompson and Sister Mary Aguinas Weber, and campaign co-chairs John Lowery, Kate Wolters and the late Deb Bailey reinvigorated the CTM Campaign in late 2019, leading over 40 dedicated volunteers and steering the effort through the pandemic to ultimate success.

The College secured unprecedented multimilliondollar gifts over the course of the CTM Campaign, raising over \$16 million for scholarships; growing the Aguinas endowment to \$52 million; building the new St. Thomas Aguinas Fulton Street entrance and Our Lady Seat of Wisdom Chapel at the heart of campus; strengthening our technology infrastructure; stewarding and beautifying our 117-acre campus; and finally, raising \$25 million to renovate and expand Albertus Magnus Hall of Science. I am filled with gratitude for each person who contributed to making this possible.

With the close of the CTM Campaign, we now turn our attention to scholarships. Virtually every one of our students receives some form of scholarship, provided directly by the College — upwards of \$18 million this year alone. Our goal for 2021-2022 is to encourage unprecedented levels of scholarship philanthropy to help address this critical need.

We are launching a new giving opportunity that allows individuals, families or businesses to establish named funds with giving levels starting at \$6,000 pledged over four years (that's \$1,500 per year or \$125 per month). Contact me at gina.covert@aquinas.edu to learn more.

Aguinas recently announced the addition of three members to the Board of Trustees. New members include Matt Biersack, M.D., president of Mercy Health Saint Mary's and Margaret Kennedy, CPA, director, private company services assurance at PwC. Returning to the Board is Robert C. Woodhouse, Jr. '77, MM '92, president of Restoration Technology, Inc. I am pleased to welcome the diverse experiences and perspectives these leaders will bring to our work of advancing the mission and values of our Catholic and Dominican educational community.



To kick off Homecoming weekend. Aguinas College made headlines with the announcement of a record-setting gift, which helped complete our historic Contributing to More Comprehensive Campaign. This news culminated in a community-wide celebration and dedication of Albertus Magnus Hall of Science.

For the dedication, Monsignor William Duncan offered a blessing of the new science facility. Sister Damien Marie Savino, FSE, Ph.D., dean of science and sustainability, alumna Dr. Patricia Gussin '67, student Michelle Thompson '23 and President Kevin Quinn offered remarks. Board Chair Marcie Hillary '97 announced to the crowd that the College had received the largest individual donation in its history for the new LEED-Gold certified Hall of Science — a \$3 million gift from Peter '77 and Carolyn Sturrus.

During the event, Peter shared that he and Carolyn were drawn to the project by the opportunity to support science and faith-based education simultaneously. In recognition of their generous donation, the atrium, which bridges the renovated portion of Albertus Hall and the new addition, has been named the Peter and Carolyn Sturrus Atrium. The Sturrus Atrium connects the Peter M. Wege Wing, recognizing a significant donation from The Wege Foundation, with the Sister Mary Aquinas Weber, O.P. Wing, named by another significant gift made anonymously to honor the College's chancellor emerita.

The gift propelled the College past its CTM Campaign goal with more than \$61≠ million raised, another historic accomplishment for Aquinas.

"We are deeply honored and humbled by Peter and Carolyn's extreme generosity," said President Quinn. "The new science facility is transforming the way we serve our students. It is a point of pride for all Saints and a symbol of the future of Aquinas College."

This is not the first major gift Aguinas has received from the Sturruses. In 2008, they were lead donors for the construction of the Sturrus Sports & Fitness Center, which sits at the opposite end of campus from Albertus Hall.

"We feel joy and satisfaction in extending the arm of God's love to students from all walks of life," Carolyn Sturrus said. "We believe if anyone has any inclination to give, there is no better cause than education."



Linda and Tony jokingly tell people that they have three children: a son, Brian, a daughter, Ellen, and the Contemporary Writers Series at Aquinas College.

The idea for the Contemporary Writers Series was conceived in the late 1970s when Linda was in the Masters of Fine Arts program at Goddard College in Vermont. There she was exposed to world-renowned authors and poets who were at the start of their careers. "The aura of being around these people helped me appreciate readings and class discussions with talented authors. I always thought that if I had the wherewithal and chance to do something like this at our alma mater, I would."

In the mid-90s, and after years of success in their careers, Linda and Tony presented the Contemporary Writers Series to Aquinas leaders. They spent a couple of years building the infrastructure, funding the operating budget and later started an endowment for ongoing support.

The list of authors who have come to Aquinas through the Contemporary Writers Series is nothing short of phenomenal, including the likes of Seamus Heaney, Michael Ondaatje and Joy Harjo. This year is no exception, with the Contemporary Writers Series marking its 25th season.

Their Story Began at Aquinas

Tony and Linda met when they were freshmen in a humanities class in 1968. She was from Cleveland, Ohio, and on a full-ride GM scholarship to study political science, sociology and economics. Tony had attended St. Joseph Seminary for high school, and at the time, it was set up that all seminarians would go to Aquinas for two years before going to a seminary elsewhere in the country to gain wider experience leading to a BA.

Tony left Aquinas junior year to attend the University of San Diego but, as he describes, "I began thinking that my life was being guided in a different direction." Years of working as an orderly during the summer months and volunteering at St. Mary's led him to think about medicine. After successfully taking an anatomy class in San Diego-quite a change from his philosophy major—Tony left the seminary and returned to Aquinas to double major in philosophy and biology with a chemistry minor. He graduated in '73 and went on to Wayne State University Medical School. He proposed to Linda that

Tony enjoyed a long career as a general surgeon before retiring in 2017.

"Aquinas allowed me the opportunity to think about the true course of my life and supported me in the decisions that I made as I proceeded in my career. It prepared me to take on the rigors of medical school and beyond," Tony said.

After earning her MFA, Linda has authored twelve collections of poetry, including *The Blue Divide*, *The Lake Michigan Mermaid* (2019 Michigan Notable Book), *Talking Diamonds* and *Amber Necklace from Gdansk*. In 2003, she was named the first Poet Laureate of Grand Rapids, Michigan. She continues to write, publish and teach—with no current plans to retire—and just completed a new manuscript of prose poems.

"Aquinas opened the door to my life. I met the love of my life here. His love is in every image I imagine and every page I write," Linda said. "I also met some of my best friends here. These connections have supported, encouraged and nurtured me. In addition, I took a course in Creative Writing from Herbert W. Martin which helped lay the groundwork for pursuing my career in poetry."

Giving Back

Tony and Linda have chosen to give back to Aquinas in a variety of ways. In addition to the Contemporary Writers Series, they recently donated both a work of art and a significant monetary gift to benefit Albertus Magnus Hall of Science. They also funded the Foster Planet Walk on campus. Linda and Tony plan to leave a bequest to the College that includes part of their extensive book collection for the library.

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A SUMMER DEDICATED TO SCIENCE



Yadira DeLeon-Lopez was one of six students selected to participate in Aguinas College's highly competitive Mohler-Thompson Summer Research Grant Program. Over the summer months, Yadira teamed up with Dr. Rebecca Flaherty, assistant professor of biology, to study Group B Streptococcus (GBS). GBS infections can be passed from mother to baby in utero and, in some cases, may lead to life-threatening illnesses for the baby.

Their research explored whether certain cell signals might play a role in an infant's immune response to GBS. They investigated why some strains of GBS are eliminated rapidly by the immune system, while others cause severe infections. These new insights could lead to the development of diagnostics and therapies to ward off infections, and ultimately, save babies.

"It's neat to know that our findings could one day lead to better outcomes for mothers and babies," Yadira said. "This experience has allowed me to take what I have learned in my classes and connect it to real-life research. It is

one thing to learn about a chain of cells in a textbook, but we were working with the actual cells in the lab."


To finish out her Mohler-Thompson Summer Research experience, Yadira will host poster presentations about the research findings at conferences throughout the year.

"This is what we do in science to communicate what we learn through research," Dr. Flaherty said. "Through this program, students like Yadira are learning lab techniques, documenting and contributing to research that has the potential to make a difference. This is not a typical undergraduate experience, and we are proud to offer meaningful opportunities like this at Aquinas."
