HISTORY & POLITICS

The Declaration of Independence: America's Birth Certificate

Presented by: Richard Bell, PhD

The Declaration of Independence is a peculiar thing. It's a literary masterpiece that was written jointly by a committee of fifty people. It's short and punchy, but still somehow daunting and difficult to grasp. And what is it exactly? Is it a birth certificate announcing happy news, a petition for divorce full of grievance and score-settling, or something else? Who is the target audience? Was it the first of its kind, or an imitation of a genre already well established? This course explores the fascinating origins, misunderstood purpose, and extraordinary global legacy of America's founding document.

Jan 13, 2026: Time to Part - Trace the remarkable journey of the Declaration of Independence since 1776, including its survival during the 1814 Burning of Washington, its role in the 1876 Centennial, and its protection at Fort Knox during WWII. Roll back the clock to define the crisis of empire in the early 1770s that culminated in a motion in Congress to declare independence.

Jan 20, 2026: These Truths - This session dissects the work of the five-person committee appointed to draft the declaration in June 1776. Deconstruct Jefferson's celebrated preamble—tracing its roots to the writings of John Locke, George Mason, and others—and see how he distilled complex Enlightenment ideas into simpler, more forceful sentences loaded with meaning.

Jan 27, 2026: He Has... - Examine the Declaration's central list of grievances which provide the essential motive for independence. Then, review the momentous events that unfolded when Congress finally opened debate on the question of independence and approved the motion on July 2.

Feb 3, 2026: All the People Say Amen - Congress intensively edited Jefferson's draft declaration on July 2, 3, and 4. The delegates made 86 changes and cut the text by a quarter, resulting in a sharper, more persuasive document. First proclaimed in public on July 8, it spread rapidly across the colonies, sparking public celebrations and sharp rebuttals.

Feb 10, 2026: Little or No Notice - As it turns out, the Declaration was crafted not only to justify breaking from Britain but to attract foreign allies, leading to its immediate translation into French and Benjamin Franklin's mission to Paris. How did the document's reception in Britain—where pamphleteers took it apart point by point—compare to its reception across the rest of Europe?

Feb 17, 2026: A **New Birth of Freedom -** How has the Declaration's bold assertion of sovereignty inspired 100+ similar documents worldwide and fueled independence movements against empires? This session demonstrates how, here at home, the Declaration's soaring language became a touchstone for struggles from abolition and women's suffrage to civil rights.

Richard Bell is a critically-acclaimed author and award-winning professor of early American history at the University of Maryland, College Park. He received a BA from the University of Cambridge in his native England before earning an MA and PhD in history from Harvard University. Bell serves as a trustee of the Maryland Center for History and Culture.

Forecasts and Formulas: How Mathematicians Untangled the Weather


Presented by: Michael McDaniel, PhD

You don't need a mathematician to tell you the weather is crazy—but you'll get three of them in this course anyway. In the 1950s, MIT mathematician and meteorologist Edward Lorenz fashioned equations using temperature, pressure, and humidity as inputs to predict the weather. He discovered that tiny changes in the atmosphere can lead to big, unexpected outcomes—the foundation of chaos theory and the famous "butterfly effect." Decades later, Joan Birman and Ken Williams asked whether this seeming randomness hides any structure. They found that the looping paths inside Lorenz's model actually form intricate knots, like tangled pieces of string. See how mathematicians uncovered surprising order within chaos, and helped generate the first computerized weather models.

Michael McDaniel is a professor emeritus of mathematics at Aquinas College, where he spent twenty-seven happy years teaching and publishing primarily in geometry. A relic from the days when a math PhD guaranteed steady employment, McDaniel earned both an MS and PhD in mathematics from George Washington University. Do not get him going about ferrets.

Can Sound Waves Fight Cancer?

Presented by: Dr. Clifford S. Cho, MD

Histotripsy is a novel, non-invasive cancer treatment that uses focused ultrasound waves to liquify tissues and disrupt tumors. Over the past two decades, this procedure has transitioned from engineering discovery to clinical reality. In this course, one of the pioneers of histotripsy will describe this disruptive new technology, highlight its unique biological effects, and consider how these effects could transform future cancer therapy.

Clifford S. Cho is a surgeon-scientist with joint appointments as the C. Gardner Child Professor of Surgery at the University of Michigan, professor of cell biology at the Van Andel Institute, and chief medical officer at University of Michigan Health-West. He is a graduate of the Vanderbilt University School of Medicine. Dr. Cho led the clinical trial that expedited FDA approval of histotripsy. His research and clinical focus is on the surgical management of liver and pancreatic cancers, cancer immunology, and immunotherapy.

Every time you read an article, watch a commercial, or click a link, you find "experts" sharing competing claims about "the best" proteins for brain health, losing weight, an improved immune system, or glowing skin—and it's easy to get lost in the noise. Cut through the confusion by exploring the fundamentals of protein science: what proteins are, how they function in the body, and why they matter. This course analyzes common misconceptions and marketing myths, offering a clearer, more grounded understanding of one of biology's most essential building blocks.

Giants Among Us: Artists Mathias Alten and Armand Merizon

Presented by: Caroline Cook

It's nearly impossible to step into a prominent building in downtown Grand Rapids without encountering the work of Mathias Alten or Armand Merizon. Their paintings brighten public spaces throughout the city—from the Grand Rapids Public Library and St. Cecilia Music Center to historic churches, hospitals, universities, and galleries. Though their lives overlapped for only eighteen years, these two world-renowned artists made Grand Rapids their home and left an enduring cultural legacy worthy of celebration.

Jan 22, 2026: Mathias Alten - Explore the life and career of Mathias Alten (1871-1938), a German-born American impressionist known as the "dean of Michigan painters." Alten was nationally recognized for his landscapes, still lifes, and portraits.

Jan 29, 2026: Armand Merizon - A West Michigan native, Armand Merizon (1920–2010) constantly experimented with style, media, brush techniques, and color relationships. This session details how his photo-realistic landscapes evolved into abstraction in the late 1980s when macular degeneration began to blur his vision.

OLLI member **Caroline Cook** is the founder and chief tour ambassador of Grand Rapids Running and Walking Tours. Known as the "Docent of Downtown," she is a proud Grand Rapids resident, supreme storyteller, citizen historian, and exercise enthusiast. With a menu of 90+ unique, thematically-organized tours, Caroline has become the local resource for healthy, "burn while you learn" events.

Human Trafficking in West Michigan

Presented by: Amanda Colegrove, MA, Becky Diffin, and Sgt. Kailey Gilbert

Human trafficking is a hidden crisis happening in plain sight—even in our own community. Offered during Human Trafficking Awareness Month, this course defines the problem, identifies risk factors increasing vulnerability, explains the warning signs, and highlights the work of the West Michigan Human Trafficking Task Force—a collaborative, survivor-centered initiative led by local law enforcement and community advocates designed to strengthen collective awareness and help end human trafficking.

Amanda Colegrove is the human trafficking task force coordinator for Safe Haven Ministries. A graduate of Aquinas College, she also has an MA in geography from the University of Missouri. Colegrove has worked in the anti-trafficking sector for nearly fifteen years.

Becky Diffin is the community advocacy manager at Safe Haven Ministries. For over a decade, she has helped survivors of human trafficking and domestic and sexual violence. A member of the West Michigan Human Trafficking Task Force, Diffin has created and facilitated training sessions for survivors, law enforcement, advocates, and community members.

Sergeant Kailey Gilbert is a law enforcement officer with over a decade of experience with the Kent County Sheriff's Office. She supervises detectives within the Human Trafficking Division, the Family Services Unit, and the Children's Advocacy Center.

Jan 28, 2026: The Celebrants (2023) by Steven Rowley - A group of five college friends reunite decades after graduation to honor a pact they made in their youth: to throw one another living "funerals" whenever life becomes too heavy to bear. Through humor, heartbreak, and long-held secrets, they confront aging, grief, and the enduring bonds of chosen family. (Kohloff)

Feb 25, 2026: Isola (2025) by Allegra Goodman - Heir to a fortune, Marguerite is orphaned and taken to New France by her volatile guardian, where an illicit friendship leads to her brutal abandonment on a remote island. Forced to survive the elements with no hope of rescue, she discovers inner strength and faith she never knew she possessed. (Radisauskas)

Mar 25, 2026: This Other Eden (2023) by Paul Harding - In 1792, a formerly enslaved man and his Irish wife take refuge on Apple Island off the coast of Maine, where they build a life together and establish an interracial community. Their world remains small but relatively safe until 1912, when well-intentioned outsiders—a missionary schoolteacher—and eugenics-minded authorities intervene. (Holst)

Susan Kohloff is a program administrator at OLLI at Aquinas College. In her previous life, she was a senior administrator and deputy warden with the Michigan Department of Corrections. She has a BS from Aguinas College and an MPA from Grand Valley State University.

Christina Radisauskas is the director of the Grace Hauenstein Library at Aquinas College. She holds a BA in English language and literature from Grand Valley State University and a Master of Library and Information Science (MLIS) from Wayne State University.



She earned an MPH from the University of Michigan—where she also holds an adjunct faculty appointment—and an MD from Wayne State University. Dr. Bagdasarian is a fellow of the Infectious Diseases Society of America, she chairs Michigan's Public Health Advisory Council, and she serves as a member of Governor Gretchen Whitmer's Cabinet.

The Clapp Family Mastodon

Presented by: Cory Redman, PhD

Can you dig it? The Clapp Family Mastodon is a juvenile American mastodon (*Mammut americanum*) skeleton—nearly 70% complete—discovered by a crew working on a drainage project near Kent City, Michigan. It is named after the landowners, Courtney and Michael Clapp, who generously donated the remains to the Grand Rapids Public Museum. This presentation explores the story behind the find—from its unexpected discovery and careful excavation to the preservation and scientific study that followed. See what this rare specimen reveals about Michigan's environment 13,000 years ago during the last Ice Age when mastodons still roamed the earth.



Cory Redman is the science curator at the Grand Rapids Public Museum. He has a BS in zoology and geology from the University of Wyoming, an MS in biology from San Diego State University, and a PhD in geology from Texas A&M University. Dr. Redman specializes in paleontology and has been fortunate to conduct fieldwork at sites around the world.

It is said that if you don't like the weather in Michigan, just wait five minutes. This highly interactive course invites participants to pose a variety of weather-related questions while exploring the causes of our state's famously unpredictable continental climate. How do the Great Lakes provide a thermal buffer, influencing everything from lake-effect snow to humidity and summer thunderstorms? What do El Niño, La Niña, and the Polar Vortex really mean for seasonal outlooks? And what modern tools, technology, and techniques do meteorologists use to forecast both short-term and long-term trends?

Joel Fritsma is the chief meteorologist of Michigan Storm Chasers, Michigan's #1 and most-trusted source for statewide severe weather coverage, storm chasing, weather education, and daily forecasts. He holds a BS in meteorology and geographic information sciences from Central Michigan University.

America Has Daddy Issues: The "Founding Fathers" and US Politics

American politicians daily invoke the metaphor of the "Founding Fathers" when referring to the men who supposedly set the United States on a path to greatness. Likewise, George Washington is known as the "Father of His Country," while James Madison is called the "Father of the Constitution." Why are these metaphors repeated constantly—and what effect do they have on policy? How might this rhetorical strategy be linked to the rise of patriarchal white supremacy and Christian nationalism? And how might this language lead to disputes over what kind of nation America is or *should* be?

Sarah Kornfield is a professor of communication at Hope College. She earned an MA in communication from Texas A&M University and a PhD in communication from The Pennsylvania State University. Professor Kornfield analyzes the public persuasion of sexism, specializing in the analysis of television, US politics, and Christian cultures. She recently authored Invoking the Fathers: Dangerous Metaphors and Founding Myths in Congressional Politics.

Chasing the Northern Lights

Presented by: Melissa F. Kaelin

You don't need to go to Tromsø, Norway to see the aurora borealis—even though the town, more than 200 miles north of the Arctic Circle, is considered one of the best spots to view the natural phenomenon. Despite their rarity, see what it takes to catch an awe-inspiring display of the Northern Lights in your own backyard. This course will take a closer look at solar activity, space weather, geomagnetic storms, and rare sub-auroral phenomena, and explore the tools you need to catch the next powerful show.

Melissa F. Kaelin is the founder of the Michigan Aurora Chasers, a robust community of people who experience and photograph the Northern Lights. She studied journalism at Miami University (Ohio), and currently manages communications for the University of Michigan Department of Climate and Space Sciences and Engineering. She is the author of Beyond the 45th Parallel: The Beginner's Guide to Chasing Aurora in the Mid-latitudes.

A Visit to Macaronesia

The Bonds We Build: The Dynamics of Attachment Theory (Part II)

Presented by: Terry Keller, PhD

Still wondering why we are the way we are? Maybe the answer is in the stories we tell? This continuing exploration of the science of connection puts this theory to the test... literally. See how structured questions within the Adult Attachment Interview (AAI) elicit patterns of how someone thinks, remembers, defends, and talks about important formative relationships. Then, through interactive exercises and guided demonstrations, use the dynamic-maturational model of attachment and adaptation (DMM) to identify how these patterns—such as shifts in language and tone, pauses, emotional reactions, or story structure—highlight different ways individuals adapt to (or protect themselves from) their early childhood experiences.

Terry Keller is the provost and vice president for academic affairs at Aquinas College. A graduate of Aquinas College, he earned an MSW from Saint Louis University, and PhD in social work from Michigan State University. Dr. Keller is a Licensed Master Social Worker (LMSW), therapist, and professor whose research interests focus on early interactions between parents and their young children.

My German Story: In the Shadow of the Wall

Presented by: Katharina Häusler-Gross, PhD

The Berlin Wall remains one of the most powerful symbols of division, political confrontation, and the struggle for freedom in the twentieth century. While it once represented oppression and separation, it also came to embody the peaceful revolution of 1989, and the reunification of Germany. This course will explore the history and impact of the Wall through a blend of socio-historical analysis and a deeply personal perspective. Drawing on literature, art, travel, and lived experience, examine how the Wall shaped life in East Germany, how its fall continues to influence German society, and how memory and meaning are preserved today—more than thirty-five years after reunification.

Katharina Häusler-Gross is a professor of German studies and the director of grants, compliance, and strategic engagement at Aquinas College. Born in the former East Germany, she came to the United States as a Fulbright Scholar and earned a PhD in German studies from Michigan State University. Through research, teaching, and community engagement, Professor Häusler-Gross continues to explore memory, culture, and lived experience in postwar and post-Wall Germany.

Disenfranchised Grief

Presented by: Christina Zampitella, PsyD, FT

Disenfranchised grief arises when a loss—whether related to death or other significant life changes—is not recognized, supported, or granted legitimacy by society. When grief is denied this social validation, individuals may feel compelled to "shut down," mourn in isolation, or question the worthiness of their own pain, which can compound the emotional challenges inherent in loss.

Feb 11, 2026: When Can I Grieve? - This session examines the concept of disenfranchised grief, identifies diverse pathways through which grief becomes marginalized, and illuminates how societal responses can inadvertently contribute to this disenfranchisement.

Feb 18, 2026: How Do I Grieve? - The second session will focus on pathways toward empowerment: addressing ways the bereaved can challenge invalidation, connect with meaningful sources of support, and ultimately foster healing and growth when their grief is acknowledged and honored.

Christina Zampitella is a licensed clinical psychologist, fellow of thanatology, and founder of the Center for Grief and Trauma Therapy in Wilmington, Delaware. She earned an MS in counseling psychology from Immaculata University (Pennsylvania) and an MS and PsyD in clinical psychology from the California School of Professional Psychology (CSPP) at Alliant International University. Dr. Zampitella is an internationally recognized professional speaker, adjunct professor, and podcast host of Phoenix Rising with Dr. Z.

The Evolution of Broadcast Meteorology


Presented by: Bill Steffen

Mar 4, 2026: Antiquity - Trace the role of the poet to lionize (and subtly satirize) political power from ancient Greece and Rome through the Middle Ages, to the time of Dante and Chaucer.

Mar 11, 2026: Renaissance - Follow the rise of civic poetry from Elizabethan England to the Victorian era, when writers like Tennyson and Longfellow vied for poetic supremacy and helped define the ambiguous but powerful ethos of the "national spirit."

Mar 18, 2026: Modern Age - Examine global voices from the 20th and 21st centuries—from Osip Mandelstam in Soviet Russia to Seamus Heaney in embattled Ireland—who wielded poetry as a force for freedom, dignity, and democracy in times of turmoil.

Michael Stevens is a long-time English professor, author, and independent scholar. He holds an MA in liberal studies from St. John's College and a PhD in literature from the University of Dallas. Stevens's scholarship focuses on the history of baseball and American literature—specifically the works of his hero, Kentucky poet-farmer Wendell Berry.

Waves and Warnings

Presented by: Jim Maczko, MS, and Bob Dukesherer

Red sky at night, sailors' delight. Red sky at morning, sailors take warning. How does the National Weather Service (NWS) protect Michiganders from severe storms and dangerous Great Lakes conditions?

Mar 16, 2026: Weather Warnings and Emergency Communication - To fulfill its mission of protecting lives and property, the NWS must effectively bridge the gap between meteorological science and the communication of critical life-safety information. Hosted during Michigan Severe Weather Awareness Week, this session will focus on the NWS Watch, Warning and Advisory program and detail how the NWS collaborates with public safety officials and broadcast media to disseminate vital weather warnings to the public. See how the NWS works directly with Emergency Management to assist communities in preparing for, responding to, and recovering from natural hazards. (Maczko)

Mar 23, 2026: An Expert's Guide to Great Lakes Coastal Dangers - The Great Lakes are vast inland seas, offering both breathtaking beauty and hidden danger. The combination of high population density, popular beaches, and strong winds frequently create conditions for potential drownings. What makes a Great Lakes swim zone dangerous? This session dives into coastal meteorology and water dynamics, providing skills to "read" a Great Lakes beach like an expert—to see the subtle, and often invisible forces that create rip currents, structural currents, and dangerous nearshore waves. (Dukesherer)

Jim Maczko is the warning coordination meteorologist at the National Weather Service in Grand Rapids. He has a BS and MS in geography from Ohio University. As a Michigan Professional Emergency Manager, Maczko's professional focus is to foster strong relationships and utilize effective communication to enhance emergency preparedness.

Bob Dukesherer is a senior forecaster and marine program leader at the National Weather Service in Grand Rapids. With over thirty years of experience, he issues forecasts and warnings, including those specifically for Lake Michigan. Dukesherer is actively involved in the NWS Beach Hazards program and serves as a board member of the Great Lakes Water Safety Consortium.

Yet as federal resources face increasing pressure and private companies assume a larger role, new opportunities and concerns emerge: Who owns the data? Keith Seitter is a distinguished visiting professor of environmental studies at the College of the Holy Cross. He earned his BS in meteorology from The Pennsylvania State University and a PhD in geophysical sciences from the University of Chicago. He is a senior policy fellow and executive director emeritus of the American Meteorological Society (AMS).
